In "The New Species," by a 9 year-old from Texas named Shaan, "the greatest detective in the world" Tech Jones and his "partner in mysteries Dr. Jim Bennett" are on the hunt for "the mysterious creature from the papers." Their adventure winds up being "the strangest case we've ever had!



When we read this story, we were inspired by the words "the mysterious creature from the papers." It made us think about newspaper "headlines."

A "headline" is the title of a news story. It tells you a tiny bit about something really important that happened, and aims to get you excited to read more. For example, if the news story was about a dog who brought food to some people who were lost in the woods, it might say:

THELPFULTOUND BRAVELY SAVESTUNGRYTHIKERS.

Then there might be a picture of the dog underneath the headline.









We made some headlines of our own that are all sentences taken right out of "The New Species." Take a look on the next page!
