WHAT'S THIS ACTIVITY ABOUT?

Learn some Spanish words and use them to draw a picture or write a story.

WHAT STUFF DO I NEED?

Paper and something to draw or write with, and the vocabulary sheet on the next page.

In the story "Teachers are People Too?!" by a 10 year-old from Utah named Lilly, students from a Spanish and English bilingual school go on a camping trip. During the trip, their teacher, Señor Niles, teaches them new Spanish vocabulary related to camping.

Take a look at the vocabulary sheet on the next page and you will be able to learn some of that same Spanish camping vocabulary! It's got everything from "are we there yet?" (¿Ya llegamos?) to "marshmallows" (los malvaviscos). Something you might notice is that in Spanish, you put question marks and exclamation points at the beginning AND the end of a sentence that uses them, but the ones at the beginning are upside down. What?! (¡¿QuÉ?!) It's pretty fun to do it that way!

Once you've learned a few words, use them in a picture or a story of your own! For example, you might draw a picture of a place with lots of marshmallows and werewolves, and label the picture with some of the Spanish words.



Or write a story that uses some of these words! You can also look up new words on a Spanish-English dictionary website, such as <u>https://www.spanishdict.com/</u>
